Entertaining Angels

Hebrews 13:2 is one of my favorite biblical admonitions, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." Abraham's encounter with the three men at the oaks of Mamre in Genesis 18, which we heard about in the first lesson on June 18, is its reference point. I love the reminder that offering kindness so often ends up blessing the host as much as the guest. It helps me to err on the side of generosity whenever I am feeling tempted to be less than hospitable.

At a basic level we think of hospitality in terms offering food, drink, and even shelter to someone in need. Long before Courtyard by Marriott or fast food franchises appeared on every corner, travelers relied on the kindness of strangers along a journey. These days, a friend stops by for a visit, and we offer something like a cool drink or a cup of coffee.

The Greek word for hospitality combines the concepts of love and stranger and points us to the meaning of biblical hospitality, which has to do with making strangers into guests and making outsiders feel as if they belong. In this way, to be hospitable means not only to provide for material needs but also to offer an openness of heart that provides a space for people to enter in and be at home.

In general summer is a natural time for basic hospitality. Summer entertaining is simple. Cold lemonade and hot dogs on the grill become a feast on a sunny afternoon with family and friends. Schedules tend to be less hectic in July and August than they are in September or December. This summer at St. Peter's we have ample opportunity to entertain angels. You might participate in one of our "summer suppers" or "foyer dinners." You might enjoy a BBQ cookout or a camp-out.

In addition to the hospitality basics, we have the opportunity to practice hospitality in the fuller sense of the biblical intention. We are now becoming a neighborhood church for the first time: the homes to our west are almost completed, and soon there will be a beautifully landscaped path between St. Peter's and the Atwater development. I suggest that, either on your own or as part of one of the walks I am leading this summer, you take the time to explore that community in preparation for welcoming new residents to the area. Whatever we do to familiarize ourselves with Atwater will help us to understand our neighbors and be most hospitable. Soon you will see building to our east as the Sage Senior Living community begins to take shape. Again, this will be an opportunity for us to welcome the stranger in an open and inviting fashion.

Also this summer, we welcome the Rev. Dr. Kyle Babin among us as assistant rector. Kyle comes to us from the Diocese of Washington, D.C., as a newly ordained priest. His ministry will enliven us even further, and his arrival gives us the opportunity to practice hospitality in a particular way. I invite you to introduce yourselves and create the space for his story to enter into the story of St. Peter's.

I hope that your summer is full of unexpectedly delightful encounters with angels.

Introducing Our New Assistant Rector!

The Rev. Dr. Kyle J. Babin, a native of Texas, served as director of music and organist in a number of parishes before responding to a call to ordained ministry. He was ordained deacon at Washington National Cathedral in November 2016 and also ordained priest there in June 2017. Kyle earned a Bachelor of Music degree *summa cum laude* from Rice University, a Master of Music degree from Yale University, with a certificate from the Institute of Sacred Music, and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Manhattan School of Music. He recently completed a Master in Divinity degree *cum laude* at Virginia Theological Seminary, where he was co-recipient of the Charles and Janet Harris award for demonstrated academic excellence and leadership ability. While there, Kyle also served as an administrative assistant for the Center for Liturgy and Music, coordinated weekly Evensongs, and founded and conducted the seminary Schola.

Prior to seminary, Kyle was active in adult Christian formation, evangelism, and parish communications at his sponsoring parish. He has a deep passion for Christian formation and teaching, is particularly interested in the inseparable connection between liturgy and active participation in God's mission in the world, and is a member of the Association of Anglican Musicians.

He lives in Philadelphia with his husband Robert McCormick, organist and choirmaster at St. Mark's Church, Locust Street, and their American cocker spaniel Lana. He loves reading, traveling, learning about historic buildings, cooking, and photography.

Plan to join us on Saturday, October 28, for our first ever community barn dance—appropriately enough, to be held in the bank barn! This event is designed as an opportunity for us to invite friends, neighbors, and the surrounding community to come together for an evening of dancing, conversation, dining and good old-fashioned fun. The barn dance committee, which has been planning this event since January, is committed to the idea that it will be fun for guests of all ages.

At 5 P.M., when the barn dance begins, experienced callers Chloe and Rick Mohr will first give everyone some instruction before launching us into reel, square, and circle dances. After the dancing ends and everyone is ready for a meal, a supper of pulled pork, chicken and appropriate sides, provided by Jimmy's BBQ, will slake our hunger. Throughout the evening there will be both a silent and a live auction, and the event will conclude with a bonfire and s'mores. Tickets for the barn dance are \$20 per person or \$50 for a family.

WHAT'S COOKIN' IN THE FOOD OUTREACH MINISTRY

Wanted: Grocery Packers

Our food ministry group has the opportunity to help alleviate hunger close to home by packing sacks of groceries for families whose children have been identified by the Phoenixville School District as eligible for free or reduced-cost school lunches. Teams of volunteers pack the food, which is then distributed to these families during the school year to provide them with weekend nourishment.

The logistics are simple. We do the packing at St. John's Lutheran Church, Phoenixville, on about six Thursday afternoons from October through May. Each team chooses its own start time between 3:30 and 6:30; packing sixty sacks takes less than an hour.

What we need now is a team of five volunteers (adults or a combination of adults and young people) for this important but simple ministry. 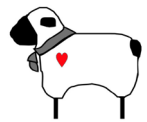
Wanted: Eucharistic Bread Bakers
