Called into Community *by the Rev. Abigail Crozier Nestlehutt*

Nine people, five llamas, seven days, six nights, 11,000 feet of elevation! For continuing education this year, I participated in an executive leadership expedition in the Wind River Range of Wyoming offered by the National Outdoor Leadership School (NOLS). We gathered initially by Zoom and introduced ourselves through information we entered on a Google doc; then we met on a patch of grass outside the NOLS Rocky Mountain center in Lander, Wyoming.

Two instructors, seven students, nine different stories. With backpacks made lighter by llamas who carried group gear, we covered a wide loop over mountain passes, around lakes, and through streams. Leadership connections arose both spontaneously in the process of negotiating group dynamics and also intentionally in planned lessons covering leadership models and case studies. Over time, our group formed a small fledgling community of sorts, and when we returned from the wilderness, we became part of another one, NOLS alumni—unique individuals bound by a common, meaningful experience. I wonder what new communities you discovered or created over this past summer.

At St. Peter's we have chosen "Called into Community" as the theme for the 2022-23 program year. Covid risks remain a reality, but after more than two years of planning around a pandemic, it is time to return to being church in a more typical way. We will continue to offer online and hybrid opportunities but will also enjoy the opportunity to be together in person more robustly than was possible last fall and winter. In the pages that follow you will find information about programs, services, outreach opportunities and more. I encourage you to discern how you are being called to engage in this community.

Also, I invite you to join with the vestry in their exploration of how we, the people of St. Peter's, are being called to develop further connections in the communities around us. Using a diocesan program called "Casting Nets," the vestry has dreamed about possibilities, identified current ministries, and systematically assessed our spaces bearing mission and ministry in mind. Everyone can be involved in this effort. It can be as simple as listening to the interests or needs of people you meet throughout the week and pondering how St. Peter's might respond, what we might offer, how we might learn.

This newsletter reminds us to be beacons, but it is not calling us to shine in one place, hoping that a traveler in need of respite might find us or wishing for someone to stop by. We are called to bring the light of Christ to the world. We are called to be the light of Christ for one another. We are called into community. On September 11 we will hear the story of the woman who lights a lamp and searches for the one lost coin. That is what the kingdom of God is like. It is a place where no one is forgotten. It is a place of relationships. A place where light seeks out and weaves connections. God's invitation to us is to be co-creators of that place right now. We are called to be that kind of community.

I am excited about the program year ahead.

On Sunday, **September 11**, our three-service schedule resumes with festive fellowship after all three services and with the return of Christian formation for all ages. As you read on page one, this new program year also has a theme, "Called into Community." St. Peter's has adopted a new record-keeping system called Realm, and we are excited about the ways it will make it easier for us to connect with one another and be involved in the community. On the afternoon of Sunday, September 11, you will receive an email with information that will help you get started.

The first step is for each person to sign into the system; doing this allows you to review your personal information on file and edit what's there, such as a phone number or address, and also to add a photograph. We will gradually introduce various other features of the system, like accessing the parish calendar, signing up for events, and managing your contact information. Rest assured that our current methods of communication will remain in place as we make this transition. Thank you!

The Choir Year Begins Anew

Several people have inquired about singing with the choirs, and the beginning of a new choir year is the ideal time to join St. Peter's music program! New members are always warmly welcomed in our dedicated groups, and we offer a choir for every age and talent.

Using a broad range of liturgical music, the **family choir** leads the psalms, hymns, and service music at 9 a.m. and also sings at special services during the year. This choir, which is open to anyone who can match pitch, is especially convenient for busy people, as its rehearsals are held every other Thursday. Prospective members are urged to contact the organist/choirmaster.

The **gallery choir** sings a challenging repertoire from the rich body of Anglican church music from medieval times to the present at the 11:15 service. Membership in this choir requires a greater time commitment for rehearsals (every Thursday) and the ability to read music well. Interested singers are invited to schedule a short interview/audition with the organist/choirmaster.

The family and gallery choirs kick off the year with their annual joint potluck supper and rehearsal at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, **September 8**. They eat, sing, and pray together and, of course, catch up on summer adventures.

Sacred Ground Returns

In response to many requests for a re-run, St. Peter's and St. David's are co-hosting Sacred Ground again this year. The series will begin with a joint opening service at St. Peter's at 4:30 p.m. on Sunday, September 18, and end with a joint service and commissioning at St. David's on Sunday, March 26, before the beginning of Lent.

Three circles have been scheduled, two of which will meet in person and one virtually. The midday Tuesday circle will meet in person from 12 noon to 1:30 p.m.; the Wednesday evening circles will meet from 7 to 8:30 p.m., one virtually and the other in person. The circle dates (Tu/We) are as follows: Sept. 20/21, Oct. 4/5 and 18/19, Nov. 1/2 and 15/16; Jan. 10/11 and 24/25, Feb. 7/8 and 21/22, March 7/8 and 21/22; like last year, the circles will take a break from Thanksgiving through Christmastide.

To simplify the sign-up procedure this year, both St. Peter's and St. David's will use the registration tool on St. David's website. All that it takes to sign up is to visit **stdavidchurch.org/adult-formation/#sacredground**, fill in the requested contact information, and select the session that meets your scheduling and format needs.

This ten-week series was created by the national church to help Episcopalians become "Beloved Community." Participants watch a variety of documentary films and read both historical and theological selections before reflecting on them in frank, 90-minute small-group discussions led by two co-facilitators every other week. At the wrap-up of last year's Sacred Ground series, the participants raised the important question, "What next?" We are currently also working on ways to follow up and seek to answer that question. Please watch for news about this in Keynotes, *The Beacon*, and the Sunday leaflets as well.



For some meetings in this new program year, the youth of St. Peter's will split into two sections, one for those in grades six through eight and one for those in grades nine through twelve. In general, the youth group meets at 10:20 a.m. on

all Sundays except the first one each month, when we have a special activity planned.

On September 11 the young people will participate in the conversation about this year's "Called into Community" theme, and on September 18 and 25 they will lead, or simply listen to, the presentation about the pilgrimission trip. In September the youth of the parish will also help plan our October 2nd Blessing of the Animals service. Please check your email for details and for information about additional events. Welcome back, children and families! We have planned an exciting Sunday school year, including Bible stories, games, crafts, music and outreach activities. It begins for all children in pre-K through fifth grade at 9 a.m. on **September 11**. To join the fun, meet up with your teacher at the front door of the barn. If you haven't had a chance to register yet, your teachers will have the forms ready for you then. You will rejoin your parents later during the announcements part of the service. We look forward to seeing you on September 11!

Christian Formation for All Ages

This fall, adult formation takes up our parish theme for the year, "Called into Community." We will ask ourselves, "Who is our neighbor?" in adult forum, exploring the ways we build relationships in our congregation, geographic area, and the larger world. We will also pay special attention to the needs and concerns of LGBTQ+ people as we work to make St. Peter's a more affirming church. Here are the ways we will engage this theme in September:



- **September 11**—Welcome back! Engaging games and activities will give us the opportunity to enjoy catching up with one another as we kick off the new program year.
- **September 18**—Youth and adult participants in this summer's Navajoland "pilgrimission" will describe their activities at three mission churches in Utah, Arizona, and New Mexico during their twelve-day visit. They will also discuss the impact that their educational, spiritual, and cultural exchange with the Diné people had on them.
- **September 25**—This second installment about the mission trip will shed light on the faith customs and traditions of the Diné people through videos from the three sites; in the videos, the priests from the three churches share stories about the history of each site, Navajo ceremonies, and Native American symbolism in the Episcopal Church.

Adult formation takes place on most Sundays from 10:20 to 11:05 a.m. in the barn. Fill your cup and plate at coffee hour, and then come fill your mind and heart by diving more deeply into our lives as Christians. All people, all questions, and all reflections are always welcome.

Please note that in October, we begin offering parish-wide adult forum sessions after the 10 a.m. "first Sunday" service. We hope you will plan to join us in October for an information session about our new interactive parish database and online giving, in November for an "LGBTQ power hour" led by the Mazzoni Center, and in December for a meet-and-greet with the priest who will fill in for Abigail during her sabbatical.

Darby Mission Back-to-School Dinner

Six years ago, in 2016, St. Peter's food ministry began serving summer dinners at Darby Mission to the grateful and deserving community there. While the pandemic shut down our ability to host these suppers in person, it did not deter us from helping our friends there by providing dinner fixings and financial support in the form of supermarket gift cards—generosity that is deeply appreciated.

Now that the pandemic has eased, on **September 6** we are resuming our traditional “back to school” Darby dinner—but in a slightly different format. With safety precautions in mind, we will prepare, package, and deliver a takeout meal to Darby. A southwestern chicken salad with corn, black beans, tomatoes, and a creamy dressing (classic “Chick-Fil-A” style) lends itself nicely to packing and transport; a freshly baked corn muffin, a bundle of red grapes, and homemade cookies will round out the menu.

To accomplish this, we need volunteers to assemble the take-out items, bake cookies, deliver the dinners to Darby, and distribute them. We will also need to borrow large coolers to transport them. We hope you've already signed on to help us with one of the many tasks necessary to bring this meal to the families of Darby, but if not, please contact Eileen Klein (215-498-8777) to do so.

A Summer to Remember

During the six-week Chester Children's Chorus summer learning program, more than 130 children made memories to last a lifetime. In addition to rehearsing for two summer concerts, the youngsters solved math problems, conducted science experiments, learned to cook, choreographed dance routines, and much, much more. Their joy spread across the Swarthmore College campus and abounded in their new home on campus where they rehearse, hold classes, and enjoy social activities.



This year CCC welcomed thirty-two new children from Chester into the program, which provides not only learning opportunities in groups and one-on-one but also round-trip transportation, breakfast and lunch, field trips, and a whole lot of fun—all at no cost to the families.

A large portion of the CCC budget (nearly \$300,000) is dedicated to the summer learning program, for which we hire more than fifty temporary staff members. This investment in the children of Chester gave them a summer to remember and continued to prove that with love and patience, they will achieve. We are now looking forward to welcoming them back for our regular school-year music and math education program.

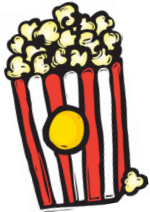

Popcorn Theology Resumes

From September through December, popcorn theology will focus on four films that feature actors and directors associated with the “method acting” movement that transformed American theater and cinema between the 1930’s and the end of the twentieth century. In its early days it included such figures as John Garfield, Montgomery Clift, Marlon Brando, Julie Harris, James Dean, Rod Steiger, Paul Newman, Marilyn Monroe, and Elia Kazan, all students of Lee Strasberg, Stella Adler, and Sanford Meisner at the Group Theatre and later the Actors Studio in Manhattan.



The movies scheduled for discussion on the second Monday of each month this fall are: September 12: *A Place in the Sun*, 1951; October 10: *A Streetcar Named Desire*, 1951; November 14: *East of Eden*, 1955; and December 12: *The Pawnbroker*, 1964. All can be viewed on Amazon Prime Video, Apple TV, Google Play Movies, Vudu, and YouTube; *The Pawnbroker*, however, is not available on Vudu.

Joining popcorn theology is easy. Just watch the movie before the meeting, and then arm yourself with a snack or beverage before joining the others on Zoom to discuss the moral, ethical, spiritual, and cinematic aspects of the film. 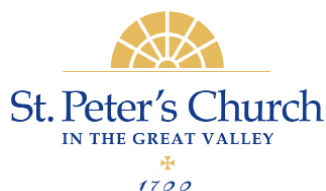

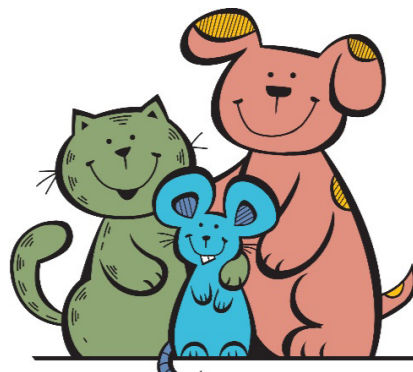
