Resurrection Joy

The pastor of the church I attended as a boy used only one illustration in his Easter sermon, and he used it every year. Since he served our congregation for nine years, I heard the story nine times. So, with that in mind, I will share it with you (but only once).

It was June 18, 1815, the day of the Battle of Waterloo, and the Duke of Wellington and Napoleon were locked in a fierce battle in a war that had raged for twenty-three years. The forces of France, led by Napoleon, were fighting against the armies of England, Holland, and Prussia under Wellington's command. The fate of Europe hung in the balance.

England waited breathlessly for news of the outcome. To learn who the victor was as quickly as possible, the British had built two towers, one on their side of the English Channel, the other on the Belgian coast. Men stationed in the tower in Belgium were to transmit news of the outcome using semaphores, so that the sentries on the English side, armed with binoculars, could read it in visual Morse code.

While the news from the front lines was being transmitted, fog rolled in, blocking the view of the English sentries. The message they read was "WELLINGTON DEFEATED." They spread the news, and England went into mourning. It was over—their forces had lost. Napoleon was victorious and once again ruled Europe; England, Holland, and Prussia were finished. There was no dancing in the streets of England that night. Instead, people went to bed depressed and scared about the future.

Since the sentries had decided to transmit the message two days in a row, they resumed their posts in the towers the next day. The sky was clear, and they sent message again. The sentries in England could not believe their eyes when they read, "WELLINGTON DEFEATED THE ENEMY."

They immediately spread the news, and sadness instantly turned into joy. Jubilant people flooded the streets, shouts of joy filled the countryside, and tears of happiness rolled down the faces of the redeemed.

On Good Friday, Jesus' disciples hid in dark rooms, behind locked doors. They could not believe what had happened. Their beloved teacher and master had been crucified. He had been defeated, and they had lost everything. Despair and discouragement gripped their hearts as they admitted, "JESUS DEFEATED." Then on Easter morning, a group of women returned from the grave to announce that he had been raised from the dead and was alive. So the message went from "Jesus defeated" to "JESUS DEFEATED THE ENEMY"

That message rings as clearly today as it did on the first Easter morning. In 2023, we bask in the glory and joy of that announcement that *HE IS RISEN, AND DEATH HAS BEEN DEFEATED*.

"Welcome to St. Peter's"

On Palm Sunday, the people of Jerusalem greeted Jesus with palm and olive branches. We hope that each person feels welcomed every Sunday, even if we don't wave palm and olive branches to greet them. Even though the liturgy invites us to exchange the Peace with each other during the service, we are also asked to do more. So before and especially *after* each service, please introduce yourself to someone you don't know.



Beginning on Palm Sunday, the newcomers commission will provide a basket of "official" greeter badges at the entrance to each worship

space as a reminder that as people of God we are called to be welcoming to one another. The commission invites everyone, parishioners and visitors alike, to take and wear a badge. It serves as our introduction to greater involvement in the wider church family. Even though there is a designated greeter at most services, let's *all* share in this joyful task, just as we share other parish responsibilities.

Vestry Nominees to be Voted on at the May 7th Annual Meeting

The 2023 nominating committee (Greg Bright, Gail Guthridge, Mike Harman, Joe Herbst, Lyndsay Knupp, Dave Lockner, Sandy Mannix, and Helen Ockenden) has named Liz Andersen, Amy Fisher, Tim Hepp, and Dave Tatum as candidates for the vestry class of 2026. nominate an additional candidate must submit a petition signed by at least ten eligible voting members to the nominating committee via Dave Lockner no later than **April 8.**

Our by-laws define eligible voters as "all confirmed persons of the age of eighteen years or upwards who shall have been worshipers in this Church as their usual place of worship for at least one year"; they also stipulate that members must be present to vote unless they have submitted an absentee ballot. If you have questions about your eligibility to vote, or need an absentee ballot, please contact our parish administrator.

We encourage everyone to attend this important event in our parish life when we reflect on the past year and look ahead to the coming one. After the service and meeting, we will gather in fellowship at a celebratory lunch, organized this year by Sarah Tellefsen. After Easter, there will be sign-up sheets in both gathering spaces for volunteers to help with the meal.

In addition, should you choose to have your directory information hidden, you can tell us that too. Finally, if you have not activated your Realm app account yet, you will receive an email inviting you to do so now, in order to access the directory online. We will continue to make available a print copy of the directory contact information to those who request one.
