Why Do We Need a Prayer Committee?

You have all been hearing that during the transition to a permanent Rector we will have three committees, Prayer, Profile and Search. The need for a Search Committee for a new Rector is obvious, but why do we need a Prayer Committee?

The Prayer Committee is meant to serve as our spiritual anchor during this time of transition, so that we don't get so caught up in the nuts and bolts of the process that we forget about what's really important. The Prayer Committee will commit to being in prayer and will encourage all of us to join in praying for guidance and direction. In addition to praying together regularly, the Committee will collect and share available resources. The Committee may also decide to write prayers that can be used by the three Committees and by other members of the congregation.

A period of transition in a parish can be a time of excitement as we engage in renewal and look to the future. It can also be a time of anxiety about what comes next.

With that in mind, here is a prayer that is included in the *Rector Transitions* book that Canon Jane Gober presented to the vestry:

Teilhard de Chardin's Prayer

Above all, trust in the slow work of God.

We are quite naturally impatient in everything

To reach the end without delay.

We should like to skip the intermediate stages.

We are impatient of being on the way to something

Unknown, something new.

And yet it is the law of all progress

That it is made by passing through

Some stages of instability --
And that it may take a very long time.

And so I think it is with you;
Your ideas mature gradually—let them grow,
Let them shape themselves, without undue haste.

Don't try to force them on,
As though you be today what time
(that is to say, grace and circumstance
acting on your own good will)
will make of you tomorrow.

Only God could say what this new spirit
Gradually forming within you will be,
Give Our Lord the benefit of believing
That his hand is leading you,
And accept the anxiety of feeling yourself
In suspense or incomplete.

Special Liturgical Season Services

Summer Schedule

The **summer schedule** began on May 25, Memorial Day weekend, with services at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. in the Historic Church. August 3 is the first Sunday of the month, with worship at one morning service at 10 a.m. in the church.

Nursery care continues throughout the summer during the 10 a.m. service. From Memorial Day through Labor Day care is provided in the Parish House. The preschool gathering area provides a wonderful space in which children may play safely. Our youngest worshipers are always welcome to join us for the service, or you may choose to have them cared for in the nursery.

Sunday School and Adult Education are on recess until September.

Reminder: All ages always are welcome at all services. The differences in the worship spaces in the Bank Barn and Historic Church may promote some interesting conversations, and there are soft bags with children's activity items and "The Sunday Paper" provided for them in both locations.

Transition Update

The Rev. Canon Jane Gober from the Diocese is assisting us with the transition from Abigail's departure to the installation of a permanent rector for St. Peter's. She has already been extremely helpful and her involvement will be invaluable as we move forward. In the transition period between now and when we have a new permanent rector, St. Peter's will be served first by supply priests over the summer, then an Interim Rector.

We also have lined up local priests to assist us with pastoral care needs over the summer. Canon Gober has identified priests who are interested in serving as an Interim at St. Peter's. Candidates for the Interim position will be presented to the vestry.

Three committees will be established to guide us through the process of finding a permanent rector, including a Prayer Committee, a Profile Committee, and a Search Committee. The Prayer Committee will serve as a spiritual anchor throughout the process. The Profile Committee will collect and summarize information about St. Peter's to be reviewed by prospective candidates. The Search Committee will review and select candidates to be considered for the permanent rector position with the assistance of the Diocese. The Committees will be composed of vestry members and other parishioners.

The entire process of discernment is expected to take about 12 to 18 months. During this time of transition, please feel free to contact Rector's Warden, Becky Dempsey, Vestry Warden, Amy Fisher, or any vestry member with questions or concerns you may have.
