## Serving, Learning, Sharing God's Love in Navajoland: Diocesan Youth "Pilgrimission," June 25 to July 7



For twenty-one eager young people and nine chaperones, the journey began with a pair of uneventful and on-time flights to Albuquerque, NM, where Bishop Gutiérrez treated them to lunch. Then they divided into three groups and began the joyful work of serving the residents of Navajoland in New Mexico, Utah, and Arizona. They did what needed to be done in each locale, including cleaning the inevitable dust that builds up in a parish hall located in a desert and helping repair a dwelling. As they made their way from place to place, they were also blessed to experience some of some magnificent natural features in that part of the country.

The photos and captions that follow give you a sample of the many ways they served, shared God's love, and *learned*—about Navajo culture, spirituality, values, and way of life, about the unforgiving but beautiful terrain that is their ancestral home, and about teamwork, themselves, and each other.







Some glimpses of their work: from left to right, packing up groceries and supplies at a donation center, delivering supplies to a grateful recipients, and prepping raised beds and planting potatoes in a parish community garden.



After learning how to make traditional Navajo fry bread, they then turned it into pizza for a community supper at Good Shepherd, Fort Defiance, AZ.





They learned about Navajo spirituality and its fusion with Christianity.



At these two very different hogans, one free-standing and the other built into the terrain, they learned about the importance of the of the hogan in Navajo life.



During their travels from place to place, they sometimes experienced the Four Corners area on foot. From these hikes they learned in truly kinesthetic ways about creation, about how God and the forces of nature created such varied rugged, spectacular beauty that the Dine people have called home for centuries.


